Three Years of SHARP Logger Program Changes

Three years ago, the national Sustainable Forestry Initiative made changes to their standards for logger training. Since SHARP is Virginia's SFI-recognized training program, we had to make changes too. The biggest change was moving from a 3-year Continuing Education cycle to a 2-year one. To keep things fair, we also decreased the number of CE credits needed from 12 to 8. Most recently, we also shortened the required SHARP Logger Update Class by 1/3rd, from 3 hours/3 CE credits to 2 hours/2 CE credits. At this time, all SHARP Loggers in good standing are on the 2-year, 8-credit schedule. This means that everyone will need to complete the Update Class plus 6 additional credits every two years. If your SHARP status expired on 1/1/2024, please get in touch to find out what you need to do.

How Many Credits Do I Need? How Can I Check My Credits?

Everyone with current SHARP status is now on an 8-credit, 2-year renewal cycle. If your SHARP logger status expired on 1/1/2024, then you might still need to earn 12 total credits. Everyone must take the required SHARP Logger Update Class in every renewal cycle. The number of CE credits you still need is printed above your name on the mailing label. If the label says "Update Needed" then you have not attended the required SHARP Logger Update Class and need the Update before you can renew. Even if you have more than enough credits, you must take the Update. The label will also show your renewal date. If it says your credits are due by 1/1/2024 then your SHARP logger status has expired and you must earn the required CE credits by the end of this year or you will have to retake the Core Program to become a SHARP Logger again.

You can also check your credits, Update status, and renewal date on the website (www.sharplogger.vt.edu), by typing your last name (only) in the "check credits" box at the top of the page. If your record does not come up, either your SHARP status is expired or there is an error. Contact the SHARP Logger Program at 540-231-6494 or SharpLogger@vt.edu.

What is Heir's Property?

Heir's Property is land that has been passed down through generations informally. It happens when a person does not have a will, their will is not written well, or is not carried out right. All of a person's children or grandchildren (possibly dozens of people) may have part ownership of the property, but no one has clear title. It can happen in any family, but is especially common for Black Virginians, who have not always had access to legal help. What happens if one owner wants to sell timber, but the others do not? Woodland can get tied up and be unmanageable. Or a timber buyer might accidentally steal timber from part-owners he doesn't know about. The land is also at risk of being lost through forced sale. 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Virginia's Hardwood Initiative

Foresters have been fighting fires for 100 years. A primary reason for the founding of the US Forest Service and state forestry agencies, Virginia DOF included, was to suppress wildfires. But for thousands of years before, hardwood forests burned regularly, and probably enough to impact tree regeneration and shape the development of today's forests.

Prescribed fire has been used for decades in pine management to prepare for planting and to suppress hardwoods in the understory. Adopting prescribed fire in hardwood stands has been slower, but it benefits oak forests primarily in two ways.

Acorns start growing best when they are on bare soil and covered with leaves, or when the leaves on the ground are less than an inch thick. In many oak forests, the leaves on the ground are several inches thick, sometimes as many as 6 inches! When acorns start growing a root, it doesn't do well if it has to go through up to 6 inches of leaves before getting to soil. Prescribed fires reduce the thickness of the leaf layer, helping oak seedlings get a better start.

Once started, these trees put a lot of energy into growing large root systems as seedlings so they resprout well after being top-killed by fire. Their biggest competitors don't put as much energy into root systems early, so they don't grow as well following fires. [continued on page 4...]

...Coincidentally, oak and hickory leaves on the ground are very flammable. So, the trees that fire helps regenerate successfully also make conditions in the forest that promote fire.

As another benefit, fires can reduce trees in the midstory, but it's been absent from the forest for so long that it is best used in combination with other activities, like Mid-story Removal written about before. That helps get the benefits from fire faster.

Not all fires are equal, and they do have their challenges. Obviously, they have to be planned and carried out by experienced and knowledgeable people. If you're curious whether prescribed fire can help the forest you're working in or your client, contact your local DOF staff or a private Certified Prescribed Burn Manager.
